In November, a group of 135 Latin students from Miramonte attended Ludi Novembres at St. Francis High School. The Northern Representative Franziska Kungys and Certamen Chair Dr. Briggs collaborated with a dedicated team of St. Francis students to ensure the convention ran smoothly. The Ludi schedule was jam-packed with activities and exciting ways to meet new students. The first event of the day was the opening assembly at 10:00 AM, where August Briggs, the CAJCL Second Vice-President, led the crowd of Latin students and sponsors in practicing some spirit cheers. Then, the assembly began, and CAJCL board members led the assembly through the JCL creed and NJCL crowd. After the assembly, students took part in academic testing.

In the week leading up to Ludi, Latin club officers at Miramonte hosted study sessions at lunch, covering topics such as grammar, daily life, mythology, history, and reading comprehension. These subjects were all featured in the Ludi tests, allowing Miramonte students to excel during the testing session and take two to three tests on subjects of their choosing.

After testing, students had a plethora of activities to choose from, including perler bead mosaics, volleyball, and even a mythological spelling bee. The fun continued post-lunch with activities such as face painting, capture the flag, and bracelet making (where students took the opportunity to make personalized bracelets for the Miramonte Magistri). Many of these activities encouraged healthy competition and bonding between Latin students. After the activities, students attended two colloquia sessions, where they could hear from high school and college professors about unique classical topics. At this Ludi, Students had fun attending lectures on Fas Food taught by Dr. Tom Garvey about the Ovidian patterns of eating. Other colloquia covered the progression of biological Latin nomenclature and ecology from Ancient Greece to the present.

The final event at Ludi was the closing assembly from 4:00-4:30. At this assembly, Franziska thanked everyone for attending Ludi Novembres and encouraged them to attend the two-day long state convention at Menlo in the Spring.



However, Polyphemus is not as strong and therefore does not want to work on Mount Aetna. Instead, he is a shepherd



on his island and lives in his cave, locked by a large boulder. One day, he hears a noise in his cave and discovers Greek people. Polyphemus meets "Nemo" or no one. He eats a Greek man, then another, then a third with cheese! However, Nemo is spared because Polyphemus wants him to help win the heart of Galatea. Nemo advises him to get her flowers because they smell and in turn, Polyphemus gives Galatea a sheep. wakes up with a stick in his eye. He screams agony and rage for "no one" and only finds Achaemenides, who informs him that Nemo is really Odysseus and they have escaped to Ithaca. Ego, Polyphemus provides a new narrative regarding Polyphemus as not a monster, but a confused friendly giant. In fact, Polyphemus arguably fulfills many of the characteristics of ancient heroes, being an extraordinary individual, a special smaller child, help from Nemo and Achamenides, Nemo and Acis being his enemies, and a troubled relationship with Galatea. Perhaps, Polyphemus was the victim all along.
